

Research and Edical Importance of František Čáda to the History of Law Culture in our Country

The important law historian and codicologist prof. JUDr. František Čáda (30. 5. 1895 Prague – 10. 10. 1975 Brno) belongs to the famous generation of Czech law historiography, which was formed under the pedagogical and professional leading of Jan Kapras. His followers represented his study successfully not only at the Faculty of Law at Charles University in Prague but they participated also in creating modern law historical branches at the founded law faculties at Komenský University in Bratislava (Rudolf Rauscher) and Masaryk University in Brno. František Čáda started his professional activities in 1926 at Masaryk University in Brno.

The extensive work of František Čáda intensified the bases of the history of state and law in our country and therefore it remains actual all the time. In the last productive period he extended his edical and research orientation by the codicological research. In this part he is pioneer and an internationally respected expert. His work becomes very important in research of the history of law culture and intelligence in our country.
