In answer to your letter from November 23d I932 I have the honor to inform you that at the present moment three windows in Saint Vitus Cathedral in Prague are finished.

- I) Planned by Fr. Kisela, prof. Umělecko-Prumyslové Školy, worked by Jean Vlasák, whose firm is on the Staroměstské náměstí, Praha I. Subject: Acts of Charity. A gift of the Ist Prague Mutual Insurance Company.
- 2) Project of Prof. A. Mucha, executed by Jan Veselý, a painter in stained glass, Prague-Karlín. Subject taken from the Cyrillo-Methodian Cycle a danation of the Bank "Slavia".
- 3) Project by Prof. Karel Svalinský, Štěpanská ul.9. Praha I. worked by Jan Jaroš, painter in glass work (Vyšehradská tř., Praha-Vyšehrad). Subject biblical, a gift of the Prince Schwarzenberg.

The 4th window is still in work ( planned by Prof.K. Svalinský), and the 5th window is just only in project.

The window which especially interests you and which is on the left side of the entrance in the chapel of Praince Schwarzenberg, the mork of Prof. K. Svalinský with the biblical subject differs strangely in its technics from all the other windows, showing a glass mosaik composed of small pieces of stained glass.

I do not know whether my short information will satisfy

you, but I am ready to give you any supplementary information and if needed I can take photos of the said windows. In this case I must have from you more definite indications as to which windows precisely and which details interest you most.

Mr. Connik's visit to the Saint Vitus Cathedral is well remembered, and all the information was given to us with the greatest good will of amability.

We still have that feeling about you both, and so I am speaking most truly when I say that we both sympathize profoundly and sincerely with you.


I appreciate your interest in my work, and sometime before long, I shall either write something myself, or shall send something that others have written.
